## The President's Column April 2024 by Laurene Lambertino-Urquizo

(Continuing our exploration into proposed changes to Article II...) In my last article I mentioned that there may be a schism underway. You might be wondering what is a schism exactly? It is the "formal separation of a church into two churches or the secession of a group owing to doctrinal and other dif-

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ferences" according to Oxford Languages Dictionary, but overall, it indicates a great divide that cannot be transversed. Many believe that is exactly what is currently happening within our Unitarian Universalist religion. If there is to be a schism it will not be the first one to occur in history. There have been others. "The Great Schism" comes to mind when in 1054 CE the Roman Catholic Church and the Eastern Orthodox Church split into two factions. And, of course, they have both survived.

Unitarian Universalism is perhaps the last of the truly free religions. We have no Dogma, no Commandments, no Pope nor Prophet at the top telling us what to do or believe. On the contrary, we pride ourselves in being encouraged to follow our own heart, and to question and explore our own conscience. In fact, we teach our own children to explore and learn about all the world religions that they might find wisdom in the teachings that will help them on their own spiritual paths. We do not look to a central authority for direction. Our Seven Principles are all about freedom and justice in the many ways that they impact our individual lives. The proposed revisions are asking us to focus in on one particular injustice: dismantling white supremacy. And as important as freedom from racism is, we are first, and foremost, a religion centering on spiritual matters and not social justice.

The desire of the UUA to change the current Article II (the Seven Principles & Sources) is not the only issue here. It is the way that the UUA is going about this. They are denying the timeold UU tradition to fully investigate this proposed change, and then talk about it, and talk again about it, and then talk about it some more, until everyone has had their opportunity to fully discuss it and propose additions, adjustments, and clarifications. In 1961, UU congregations were polled to come up with a set of guiding moral precepts that we all believe in. It took twenty years to agree on these resulting 7 Principles, but they have served us very well for over a half century. Talking things through is perhaps what we as UUs do best. And we include everyone to have a voice in that process, not just those who agree with us. The main problem now is that this time the UUA did not permit this process to occur. They presented the changes they are proposing like they were a fait accompli. No questioning allowed. And when people like Rev. Todd Eklof and others began questioning this, they began to shut them out of the process. That is the part that many feel is unfair. The UUA presented themselves alone as the final authority on the matter rather than allowing the people that make up our religion to make this choice.

Making changes to our Seven Principles is a touchy undertaking at best. Our Principles and Bylaws are the closest thing that we have to a UU Theology. The UUA clearly knew that this would not be an easy thing to do. At the core of these major changes is the proposed 8th Principle: "We, the member congregations of the Unitarian Universalist Association, covenant to affirm and promote: journeying toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse multicultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions." This proposed 8th Principle is a very worthwhile ideal for us to adopt, and many UU congregations have already done so (over 125 congregations). But it seems to be especially emphasized by the UUA.

We do periodically review our practices and propose changes. It is written in our Bylaws to do so about every decade. The desire to root out racist practices within our church began in 1841, and was revisited in 1963, 1968, 1983, 1992, 1997, **continued** 2005, 2017, and 2020.

As an organized religion, the emphasis on accepting all people into our individual churches and congregations has always been a goal that we strove for, but as an institution we have fallen short of that mark. To gain a fresh perspective into this, read Rev. Dr. Mark Morrison-Reed's article, "The Black Hole in the White UU Psyche" in the Fall 2017 edition of UU World. And before this, Rev. Dr. Thandeka authored an important paper on "Why Anti-Racism Will Fail" which she delivered in 1999 at the GA, catching many by surprise for her message as she is a Black UU minister. So, this is not a new concept. UUs have been immersed in the issue of combating racism for a long time. We must also never forget that we lost two of our own during the Civil Rights Era with the murder of Rev. James Reeb and Viola Liuzzo in Selma, Alabama in 1965.

So why this disconnect? Some UUs argue that we have been on the right side of history in this struggle for many decades, and that we are not racists. Why the need to place such an emphasis solely on white supremacy? And why now? How is this related to the discarding of our Seven Principles and Sources? Would it not be better to accept the 8th Principle as it has been proposed previously to express our ongoing dedication to eliminating racism and retain the original seven? Or will we continue on this road which threatens to split our religion into two factions? Will we see a schism as the United Methodist church did in 2019 because some in their church refused to accept gay marriage and LGBTQ+ pastors? Stay tuned...

Melli Faith gave a talk in the Crete Library on "Raising Chickens".





## Celebrate May Day or Beltane – May 1<sup>st</sup>

Beltane is a Pagan holiday, and one of the eight Sabbats. It falls about halfway between the spring equinox and the coming summer solstice. The holiday celebrates spring at its peak, and the coming summer. Beltane also sometimes goes by the name May Day. Beltane is focused on hope for the fertility of people, crops, and animals. Here are some ways to celebrate Beltane:

**1) Dance Around the Maypole** - The Maypole, a symbol of fertility, consists of a tall pole, garlanded with flowers and ribbons. Dancers circle the pole in two groups, each dancing in opposite directions, to weave the



ribbons around the pole. Join the CUUPs group at UUCC on Friday April 26<sup>th</sup>, 6-9pm for a family friendly dance around the Maypole and potluck dinner.

2) Create and Give a May basket – May baskets should be simple, filled with cakes, cookies or candy, as well as spring flowers and small trinkets. They are frequently left anonymously at the front door of a friend, neighbor or loved one. Share the wealth of spring with love.

**3) Tend a Bonfire** – Beltane is a Celtic word, meaning "the fires of Bel." Bel, likely referred to the Celtic sun god, Belenus. Spring has sprung! It is time to break out the barbeque! Bring out the grill and have a meal cooked outdoors. If you have a firepit, light up the evening with fire and bask in the glow.

# **GREEN SANCTUARY** BY JEFF GREEN - APRIL 2024



I really don't know my flowers very well. I have overheard people talking about their early flowers coming up. Crocuses. Now that is fun to see as our white landscape has disappeared and the green is taking over. Along with the green landscape comes pollen in the air. I have acquired allergies lately when I used to

never have them. Going through the pet store, my nose was itching and trying to run without a Kleenex. Thankfully I got into the car to take care of that shortly after. On the news that night, came a clip on "Warming Climate, More Pollen, Worse Allergies". Just turning 70 this month, I may have around 20 more years of living with my allergies getting worse. Clinton Green's Birthday (my son), Mar. 27<sup>th</sup> was yesterday and will live the full climate change for about the next 63 years. The news clip on TV last night referenced this site.

Key Concepts:

Our warming climate results in more freeze-days each year—giving plants more time to grow and release allergy-inducing pollen.

The freeze-free growing season lengthened by in 83% (164) of 197 U.S. cities analyzed since 1970.

These 164 cities saw their freeze-free season lengthen by 19 days on average.

Climate change contributes to earlier, longer , worse allergy seasons for millions in the U.S. that suffer from seasonal allergies to pollen—including19% of children.

Climate Central's fact sheet, <u>*Climate Change & Children's Health: Seasonal Al-</u></u> <u><i>lergies*</u>, details how the climate trends that are worsening allergy season affect children's health and well-being.</u>

#### Protecting children's health

**Respond to symptoms, not the season.** Children with allergies may experience symptoms earlier or later than usual as growing seasons expand and shift.

**Minimize exposure.** Check local air quality reports and allergen forecasts before heading outside. When pollen concentrations are , consider limiting time outdoors for children with allergies or asthma.

**Make the indoors safer and more comfortable.** Close sindows and doors to minimize aeroallergens inside. Use high efficiency particulate air (HEPA) filters in living spaces and bedrooms to clean the air.

**Commit to rapid, sustained cuts to carbon pollution from burning fossil fuels.** Because higher levels of carbon pollution will bring more and sooner benefits to allergy sufferers of all ages.








## Help Support Ronald McDonald House Charities
