Final Ballot Results, Awards & Recognition

This year, GA 2024 took place virtually and I watched by streaming it through YouTube. Next year they will hold the GA in Baltimore. I attended GA online last year as well so I could vote in the interests of UUCC as a "business-only" delegate. This year I admit that I paid much more attention. On the first day, I did not understand much of what was going on because they were dealing with procedural issues, but my fellow UUCC delegate, Allan Lindrup, was kind enough to fill me in on what was happening and what to look for.

There were things said to prepare attendees for what was to come with the Article II revision vote. Rev. Meg Riley admitted that whichever way the vote would go, some people would be "disappointed profoundly." A lot of talk occurred about our UU faith being a "living and evolving one." There were concerns expressed against risking "stagnation" if changes did not occur periodically. But likewise, some warned that we will not really know what these revisions will hold until they play out and there could be a real chance of the loss of individual freedom as the UUA becomes more powerful. The UUA is asking that we trust them, but these changes ensure that more power will be taken from the congregations and redirected to Boston (home of the UUA). The UUA seems determined to assume a more dominant position in our denomination.

The most controversial thing that I witnessed during this GA were the discussions concerning LBGTQ+ rights and the Jewish/Palestinian war. During the discussion before the vote, delegates voiced their opinions and evidently a few of the comments contained disinformation and disproven medical data that caused some people to become upset, and it was discussed at length the following day with profuse apologies given. Likewise, when the 'Solidarity with Palestinians' portion was discussed, feelings were triggered because some felt that there was not enough emphasis placed on the Israeli hostages and many were upset. The next day another resolution was added to provide support for the October 7<sup>th</sup> hostages. In addition, special chat rooms were set up where a care team and Chaplains were provided to help. GA officials admitted that a lot of mistakes had been made but they hoped to do better in the future.

### President's Column (cont.)

There was a hyper-elevated sense of "wokeness" to the proceedings that some might find objectionable these days. A lot of emphasis was placed on not offending anyone. For example, before each person spoke, they provided their preferred pronouns followed by a physical description of themselves and what they were wearing (for those who might be sight impaired, I assume). I can understand the reasons behind this practice, but I was a little shocked when some people went on to refer to themselves as "fat." Also, when UUA officials spoke, their speech was invariably peppered with flowery forms of address such as "beloved" or "dear ones" which I felt got to be a little syrupy.

Finally, people discussed either their approval for the Article II revisions (PRO) or their concern (CON). Knowing the history that led up to this vote, I felt that some of the information presented was hypocritical and hollow sounding. I did not feel that they were being honest in presenting the entirety of the changes that would be made to our faith nor their reasons for doing so. The UUA appears to have changed from an independent service organization that once supported congregations to one now seeking to control them.

After GA concluded, I consulted a few groups on social media opposing these changes to see their reactions. I saw that some of the comments stated that they would be leaving the faith, and I was incredibly sad to read their words. I do not feel that one should leave Unitarian Universalism at this point but to remain and see what could be done to effect change. There are currently groups and alliances that are being formed that will present alternatives. I am interested in these possibilities to see what direction UUCC may choose to follow in the future. In that spirit, I am formally requesting that we form a Task Force to investigate the various controversies surrounding both Article II and Article III revisions to the UUA Bylaws and their plans for the future of Unitarian Universalism. If you would be interested in joining this Task Force, please contact me. I have discussed this possibility with Rev. Denise Tracy and she will help to guide us. Stay tuned.








### Connections by Barb Anderson



# **GREEN SANCTUARY** BY JEFF GREEN - JULY 2024



As the earth swells in numbers of humans on the planet, our effects on our living system is showing signs of stress. Before I go to my main subject of interest, I want to talk about a historical account in the past. In Great Britain,

London's population grew dramatically over the centuries to 2.35 million people between 1800 and 1850. Along with that came the problems of pollution, drinking water contaminated, and an overburdened and obsolete sewage system. Cholera broke out killing 10s of thousands of people. Londoners had to transition to an improved sewer system. People did not understand back then where Cholera came from. Parliament in 1859 could smell the effects of the sewage and refuse then and finally acted on it. The period of history is called "The Great Stink".



The above example is a necessary transition of large numbers of people living closely together to manage different kinds of waste including human waste. Another kind of waste to consider is the waste of burning fossil fuels. Here we are using the air as our sewer adding all kinds of gaseous pollutants to it. We are now in transition to cleaner energy. There are signs of change coming. Gasoline car sales are in the start of decline. There has been all kinds of information going around that EVs are the ones coming to an end when in reality the opposite is true.

### The Facts Are In: It's Not Looking Good for Internal Combustion

The "EV slowdown" is overblown. It's internal-combustion cars that are on their way out.



As recently as 2016, roughly 700,000 plug-in cars were sold worldwide, according to the IEA. Put simply, annual electrified vehicle sales have exploded by 2,000% in well under a decade.

Projected out to 2030, it's quite easy to see internal combustion engines for cars are in serious decline. China is the most aggressive market in the world where EVs have a 50% market share.



On a different graph, same article, Bloomberg has a projection by 2040 of EVs having 75% of world sales. If you were to listen to petroleum-based projections, EVs would be barely denting the

Plug-in car sales in the U.S. will end the year up 20% over 2023, BNEF says, less than the 32% it had previously projected. Still, it expects plug-in cars to make up 29% of the U.S. vehicle market by 2027. Looking out a few years, the health of America's EV transition hinges on whether cheaper models materialize in a meaningful way, said Cantor. Think a range of different models in the \$25,000-\$32,000 range, after incentives. Those kinds of vehicles are in the works from Ford, GM, Jeep, Kia and others.

This is transition with a deadline. The slower we go, the worse the consequences of polluting the atmosphere. Batteries and technology have come together to make a cleaner way of travel. Once fossil fuels are eliminated from the electrical grid, we will be entering a near carbon free time to travel to grandma's or the grocery store. Solving this issue was like "The Great Stink" of London. The trouble is co2 doesn't stink. It's invisible and we depend on instruments to tell us what is happening. But now we know.

"The Great Stink" is one of my favorite analogies to what is happening today. As humans burden the living system of earth, it is a struggle for awhile before society starts to move on changing our sewage system or changing our energy systems. I have enjoyed watching this part of our society move forward on this issue. And to be able to talk to you about it in these postings. Thank you for letting me part of your reading pleasure.
